Books Discussed

Fall of Giants by Ken Follett

This is an epic of love, hatred, war and revolution. It is a huge novel that follows five families through the world-shaking dramas of the First World War, the Russian Revolution, and the struggle for votes for women.

It is 1911. The Coronation Day of King George V. The Williams, a Welsh coal-mining family, is linked by romance and enmity to the Fitzherberts, aristocratic coal-mine owners. Lady Maud Fitzherbert falls in love with Walter Von Ulrich, a spy at the German Embassy in London. Their destiny is entangled with that of an ambitious young aide to U.S. President Woodrow Wilson and to two orphaned Russian brothers, whose plans to emigrate to America fall foul of war, conscription and revolution. It is a plot of unfolding drama and intriguing complexity and we felt that it moved seamlessly from Washington to St Petersburg, from the dirt and danger of a coal mine to the glittering chandeliers of a palace, from the corridors of power to the bedrooms of the mighty.

We all felt that it was very long but an utterly fascinating book. The build up to WW1 was so well done. The question we all asked was 'however did he write it?' as there are so many threads and characters in it and yet it really does read seamlessly. A few people remarked that because it did not flit about but moved chronologically it made for a much easier read and it was not bitty. It was a book we felt which allowed the reader to stop at a point suitable to them, pick it up again and not have to turn back pages to find out what was last read.

We felt that it was very atmospheric and a couple of people were very moved by the parts of the story where white feathers were used as they thought it Really moving. In a way this could be a modern version of War and Peace by Tolstoy. It takes the lives of numerous characters, male and female, who have their own storylines but frequently intersect. Alongside the domestic and personal dramas, there is also a lot of page time devoted to the fates of countries. We thought that despite the length it was a very easy-to-read book written in an interesting style. There is a lot of political content and information about battles, but somehow he manages to balance it out with human dramas in a very readable way. We thought that it improved our understanding of the politics behind the World War, Russian Revolution, and social changes in Britain at that time far better than some history books might have done.

It was a book that most of us who had read it said that we would not have done had it not been for Book Club as the cover did nothing for us and certainly the thickness of it may well have put us off!!

This was only the first book of the trilogy so there are two others to read. We scored it between 8/10 and 10/10

One person recommended Paper Money by Ken Follett which is much shorter but a cracking read she thought.

My Brilliant Friend by Elena Ferrante

My Brilliant Friend is about the close friendship, rivalry and mutual influence of two young girls living in a poor district of Naples. Elena, our narrator, is hard-working and clever, and wants to fit in. Lina is fierce and driven. She is perhaps even cleverer and more attractive than Elena, but her tendency to fight for everything means that her path is less smooth.

The community first - it's a poor district of Naples, and at the start of the story when the girls are six, it's just beginning to recover from the war years. Everyone knows what everyone else did during those years, not least because some people are still living off the ill-gotten money from their underhand behaviour. The historical rivalries and resentments play out in even the lives and friendships of the children too young to know the background, but become even more complex with Italy's post-war economic and political changes.

Lina herself is a compelling character, and we see her grow from a child, urgently wanting to conquer knowledge of all kinds, to an apparently serene and assured young woman, whose force of will means she will still not be bound by external limitations. Her friendship with Elena as they grow and change is tested many times, the little changes in power dynamics and the way the girls use them, through their progress at school, their social networks or relationships with boys are all evident throughout the book. Elena dismisses her own successes and wishes she could do well in the areas that Lina is now interested in and realises much later that Lina was going through the same things.

Well what discussion and comments this book evoked. What did we think.....?? 'Ugh' said one person; 'Waste of time' said another; 'Utter rubbish' said someone else; 'Horrendous' someone said and 'Really enjoyed it' said someone else. One person was very frustrated by the book because they felt that the beginning never materialised and so reaching the end of the book she felt a bit cheated. It was really strange because people thought that the front cover was good and made you think that you would like to read the book but obviously it did not work and yet, the person who really enjoyed the book thought that the front cover was



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was awful. She felt that the book was not like chicklit but was real writing, a progression, a journey through the lives of the characters. She thought that it demonstrated the cringing awkwardeness that teenagers can have when talking about boys or intimate moments really effectively. One person likened the book to On Chesil Beach by Ian McEwan because of the relationship elements. Another person felt that the book was an interesting look into the microcosm of Naples and that once the characters moved out of Naples they realised what they had been missing and how very insular their lives had been. It certainly changed Lina when she moved into more elevated circles and spoiled her as a character. There was a lot of business about shoes, and family honour but a few thought that it was a something-and-nothing book, which may be kept you turning the pages whilst thinking "oh who cares?!" at some of the petty boyfriend-centred squabbles. Some lost interest less than half of the way through and although the early part was gripping, as the years dragged by, with characters constantly appearing and disappearing, it became tedious and uninvolving, the style being monotonous and lacking vitality.

We scored the book between **4/10** and **8/10** although one person was quite vehement that it was a zero!!


Blindness by **Jose Saramago** plus a book of **our own choosing** with reasons why we think it is such a good read.



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


Work to replace the play equipment in the Children's play area on the playing field





Your very own hedgehog rescue centre in Appleby

Have you found a hedgehog in need? Everyone knows that we like to make our

gardens look nice, and that means you could well come across a hedgehog! But it's important to know when to leave well alone, when to step in and assist, and who to call if needs be. Just follow the handy tips below and you'll be a sure-fire winner when it comes to all things small and spiny.

Hedgehogs certainly do not like to sunbathe, so if you come across a hog looking forlorn in the day time, the best thing to do is gently scoop him up, and pop him in a box along with some water (but no food). A blanket will provide comfort and warmth if required. Then ring your local vet or hedgehog rescue centre.

In winter, things get a little more serious. Get the hedgehog indoors quickly. A hot water bottle, heat pad, or warm blanket will provide much-needed warmth. It's fine to administer cat or dog food (but nothing fish-flavoured, please). Likewise, small cat biscuits will do, but under no circumstances give them milk or bread - it does them no good at all!

Whilst people take ample care when pottering around their garden, there is always the possibility you will disturb a hog's nest. It upsets the mum greatly if her young come into contact with people, and she may well abandon the nest.

In the event of disturbing a budding hog family, ring your hedgehog rescue centre for advice, but please, leave the nest be.

Hedgehog numbers are sadly in decline. Bonfires, traffic, strimmers and many more man-made threats contribute to their falling numbers. Hedgehogs do so much

good - nibbling away at slugs and snails and devouring nasty bugs, so please, take care when in your garden.

At Andrew's Hedgehog Hospital in Appleby, there's plenty of heart - enough for any hedgehog who has ever called this place home. Some come in poorly, others down on their luck.

Being a hedgehog charity, the hospital runs from donations. If you want to help a hedgehog, get in touch and give whatever you can spare. Your help will always be appreciated. Why not go and visit and see what goes on there?



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

Andrew's Hedgehog Rescue is based in Appleby. Frank told us that he and his wife got involved with hedgehogs in 1993 when introduced to Elaine

Drewery who set up the Hedgehog Care Hospital in Authorpe near Louth. We were treated to so many stories and interesting facts about hedgehogs and to round the talk off we were introduced to Andrew Hogg, a hedgehog who seemed to take everything in his stride. He had been rescued and after some visits to the vet they ascertained that he was blind. It is not wise for a sightless hedgehog to go trotting off into the wild willy-nilly, so it was decided that Andrew should take up permanent residence at the hospital. Whenever possible hedgehogs are returned to the wild but if they cannot be then they remain at the hospital or are put into foster homes. They are never put down if they are unable to return to the wild.

Also at the meeting members were informed of the passing of Kathleen Hall who had been active in the WI for more than 60 years.

Easter Nests Recipe

225g (8oz) milk chocolate 50g (2oz) butter 2 tablespoons of golden syrup 100g (4oz) cornflakes Packet of candy-coated mini eggs 10 paper baking cases A baking tray. A large saucepan

- Place ten of the paper baking cases into the hollows of the baking tray.
- Break the chocolate into pieces and place these into a large saucepan. Add the butter into the pan. Dip a tablespoon into hot water to warm it up before using it to add the golden syrup into the pan.
- Heat the pan stirring the mixture all the time until the chocolate and the butter have melted.
- Turn off the heat. Add the cornflakes to the mixture gently stirring them until they are covered with the chocolate. Be careful not to crush the cornflakes too much.
- Put the cornflake mixture into each of the paper baking cases. Make a small hollow in the centre of each nest with the back of a teaspoon.
- Place a few eggs in each nest and then place the tray into the fridge to allow the nests to set. Remove after about an hour.
- Either keep on or remove paper baking cases and arrange on a plate when you are ready to serve them. They are best stored in an airtight container in the fridge but need to be eaten within three days.

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April / May 2017 Article by Rev. David Eames

I really enjoyed the latest series of the BBC drama 'Sherlock' and there was one particularly striking scene in the second episode 'The Lying Detective'. In the previous episode [SPOILER ALERT!] Dr Watson's wife, Mary, had thrown herself in front of Sherlock when he was shot at and she died. Watson recognises that Sherlock blames himself and wants to reassure him. He says "Mary died saving your life. It was her choice. No-one made her do it. No-one could ever make her do *anything*... but the point is: you did not kill her." Sherlock then replies quietly "In saving my life, she conferred a value on it... It is a currency I do not know how to spend," (Thanks to http://arianedevere.livejournal.com/90556.html for the transcript of the words!)

The theme of self-sacrifice is a common one in stories, but Easter gives us the opportunity to focus on the true ultimate sacrifice; Jesus' death on the cross. Just like Mary, Jesus' sacrifice was freely chosen; he said "No one takes my life from me. I give it up willingly!" (John 10:18 Contemporary English Version). But more importantly he died to save our lives. The prophet Isaiah foretold the death of Jesus in these words: "it was *our* grief he bore, *our* sorrows that weighed him down... But he was wounded and bruised for *our* sins. He was beaten that we might have peace; he was lashed—and we were healed! We, every one of us, have strayed away like sheep! We, who left God's paths to follow our own. Yet God laid on *him* the guilt and sins of every one of us!" (Isaiah 53:4-6 The Living Bible).

The wonderful good news of the cross is that Jesus took the punishment that we deserve because of our sins so that we could be forgiven and be reconciled with God. The wonderful good news of Easter is that Jesus rose from the dead so that we too could have a fresh start. This is the central message of Christianity and if it's true it has huge implications for each one of us.

Sherlock realises that Mary thought that his life was valuable enough to be worth saving. Knowing that Jesus died for us should make us realise that he thinks we are valuable, that he loves us so much that he gave his life to take the punishment we deserve. Society often values people based on their job, wealth, beauty, popularity or usefulness. God loves each of us regardless of what society thinks of us and amazingly he loves us even though we rejected him and were his enemies: "God showed his great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners" (Romans 5:8 TLB). We don't have to be good enough for God to love us, he loves us even though we're never good enough.

Which leaves us with Sherlock's problem: this value on his life is a currency he doesn't know how to spend. He doesn't know how to live in response to Mary's act. If we truly understand what Jesus did for us on the cross we too have to decide how to respond. The great hymn "When I survey the wondrous cross" gives us the answer. The only appropriate response to the love that is so amazing, so divine is to give God 'my soul, my life, my all.' What is our response to the good news of Easter?



A Poet in our Midst.

Dick Heath was born in Faldingworth, into a family who were very much connected to farming. When he left school he found a job in a garage and whilst there, completed an apprenticeship in Motor Engineering.

After completing his National Service in the R.A.F. he returned to the family farm in Holton-Le-Moor, working alongside his father and brother. After the death of his father he returned to work in a garage, this time in Greetwell, near Brigg.

A few years later he gained a post at the

Broughton annex of Bishop Burton Agricultural College as a technician and part-time lecturer. He and his family came to live in Hibaldstow 16 years ago and soon afterwards he retired from Bishop Burton. He kept active with a variety of part-time jobs until about five years ago when a period of illness required him to look for pastimes of a steadier nature. This was when he began to fill his time with writing.

He has written two novels (with a third still incomplete), short stories and poems based mainly on his experiences of life. His wife and family have encouraged him with his writing, hence his book of "30 Lincolnshire Poems - with a smile" being printed.

The poems reflect Dick's rural upbringing in the 1940's and his favourite one is "Competition Lost" as he did once have a sheep dog like the one in the poem and she was a favourite companion on the farm.
