

Books Discussed

The Elegance of the Hedgehog by Muriel Barbery

The story flits between the confessions of two women: Renée Michel, a 54-year-old concierge in a Parisian block of luxury apartments, and Paloma Josse, a precocious 12-year-old girl, the daughter of one of the most bourgeois families in the house. Renée, the concierge, is witness to the lavish but vacuous lives of her numerous employers. Outwardly she conforms to every stereotype of the concierge: fat, cantankerous, addicted to television. Yet, unbeknownst to her employers, Renée is a cultured autodidact who adores art, philosophy, music, and Japanese culture.

Then there's Paloma, a twelve-year-old genius. She is the daughter of a tedious parliamentarian, a talented and startlingly lucid child who has decided to end her life on the sixteenth of June, her thirteenth birthday. Until then she will continue behaving as everyone expects her to behave: a mediocre pre-teen high on adolescent subculture, a good but not an outstanding student, an obedient if obstinate daughter. Paloma and Renée hide both their true talents and their finest qualities from a world they suspect cannot or will not appreciate them. They discover their kindred souls when a wealthy Japanese man named Ozu arrives in the building. Only he is able to gain Paloma's trust and to see through Renée's timeworn disguise to the secret that haunts her.

Quite a few people thought this a strange book, one person thinking that it was very cerebral. There were some lovely cultural references, very French. At this point a number of people questioned whether the book had suffered in places by being translated from French. There were some words which people did not understand but guessed at what they might mean in the context of what they were reading. Some members said that they just could not get into the book but some who had read it said that after about page 60 it began to flow and one was able to enjoy the book and feel part of it. One member said that she just laughed out loud at parts of it. The short chapters, not always the same character, were a bit confusing'

It was a very class conscious book. One member made us chuckle when she said that It was and is one of the dullest, most over-rated books she had ever read. There was no way she would recommend this book and actually said that she thought it the worst book she had ever read!!

So, what did we score it well scores ranged from **5/10** to **7/10** and one definite **0/10**!!



The Shipping Forecast by Nic Compton

The rhythmic lullaby of 'North Utsire, South Utsire' has been lulling the nation's insomniacs to sleep for over 90 years. It has inspired songs, poetry and imaginations across the globe – as well as providing a very real service for the nation's seafarers who might fall prey to storms and gales. In 1995, a plan to move the late-night broadcast by just 12 minutes caused a national outcry and was ultimately scrapped. Published with Radio 4 and the Met Office, The Shipping Forecast is the official miscellany for seafarers and armchair travellers alike. From the places themselves – how they got their names, what's happened there through the ages – to the poems and parodies that it has inspired.

As always so many differing views and opinions. Some people absolutely loved it, could not put it down and found it fascinating. It was a magic book said one member and a few people said that it was a book which you could easily pick up and put down, a book suitable to read with a cup of something then leave.

One member was bored with it and explained that it just left her rather cold.

We scored it from a $\mathbf{2/10}$ to the majority of members giving it $\mathbf{10/10}$

One member had read the wrong book and instead had read **Attention All Shipping** by **Charlie Connelly**. She said that it was a journey around the shipping forecast and was amusing, hilarious, fascinating and very funny. It was very much a travel log and this particular member just could not put it down. A really entertaining book which she scored **9/10**





August / September 2017 Article

As any keen pub-quizzer will tell you, the months of July and August are named after two Roman Emperors; Julius Caesar and Augustus respectively. As humans we have a habit of

naming things after significant people as a way to commemorate, remember and celebrate them. When I went to New York, I was amused to find that a slipway was named after someone (they obviously weren't important enough to have a whole road named after them!). And at the farewell service for the last Bishop of Lincoln, the Dean relayed some of the great Bishops of Lincoln and the additions they made to the Cathedral. He joked that the major addition that Bishop John oversaw was a new toilet block, suggesting that maybe they should name it after him!

Naming things after people is not always without controversy, especially commemorations we've inherited from previous ages. Colston Hall in Bristol is to be re-named because of the Bristolian slave trader Sir Edward Colston. Oxford University has recently resisted pressure from campaigners to remove statues, paintings and commemorations of Cecil Rhodes and other colonialists. Liverpool also resisted an attempt to re-name all of the streets associated with slave traders, as this would have meant renaming most of Liverpool's most famous streets, including Penny Lane!

This desire to re-name can spring from a laudable desire to recognise the parts of our history that by today's standards are regrettable, but they can also be seen as an attempt to airbrush history. The counter argument is that, as George Santayana wrote, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." Whether we like it or not, our history, both good and bad, makes us who we are and our mistakes should be remembered so that we remember not to repeat them.

Very few people will ever have anything public named after them, which for most of us is a relief! The public scrutiny that comes with public recognition is not something that most of us would like. In our day-to-day lives we can often get away with 'airbrushing' our past and our present, hiding those bits of which we're ashamed or those bits we know others would disapprove of. Both Mark Twain and Arthur Conan Doyle claim the urban legend of sending friends or upright citizens a telegram saying "Flee at once - all is discovered" and some or all of the recipients leaving immediately! The story rings true because all of us have things we'd rather others didn't know about us. And worryingly in this age of social media, our mistakes can become widely known within hours!

Even if we can hide our skeletons from those around us, God knows everything about us and one day we too will see the whole of our lives, the good and the bad. Yet the amazing thing is that despite knowing all about us God still loves us! And more than that he wants us to say sorry for the bad things, and in his mind they will be airbrushed out so that we can start again.

The **June** meeting was well attended and we were treated to a most interesting talk about Operation Christmas Child from Ellie and Denise, both volunteers. Ellie gave us a very interesting talk about the work they do to provide shoe boxes, containing gifts of toys,

stationary toiletries etc. to children in under privileged countries such as Romania. They and other volunteers throughout the year work from 13 rooms in a Warehouse in Grimsby, packing, repacking and checking the thousands of shoe boxes that go through their hands. The Shoe box Appeal started in 1990 and so far 120 million children worldwide have received a shoe box, containing much appreciated toys and necessities. Samaritans Purse also help with water aid and other projects. In the warehouse, as well as sorting the boxes, they also collect items to enhance the boxed. For example, a small take away carton can be filled with small hotel toiletries or make up for the girls.

Vertical blinds are cut up to make pencil cases. Old Video boxes, with a nice picture added, make a lovely pencil box. Ties are collected and made into bags, hand bags, hair bands etc.

Cut up greeting cards are made into colouring books. Old broken jewellery is used to enhance bags or make more little girls jewellery. All dolls and cuddly toys in good condition are accepted.

Our July meeting was a talk given by Stuart entitled 'My Life in life's Only Certainty.' It was a most interesting an humorous talk about death. Stuart became a police officer in 1976 and dealing with dead people was part of the job as was relaying the sad news to relatives. Everyone deals with death differently just as we all grieve differently. He was appointed as an assistant coroner where the most onerous task was the identification of a body by the next of kin. In 1987 he changed jobs and part of his new role was managing two cemeteries in Derbyshire. He explained how graves have to be rodded so as to see the depth available for coffins to be put in. He moved on to become the Deputy at Woodlands Crematorium in Scunthorpe and he then became an independent funeral celebrant, 'a most fulfilling job' he said.
