# **Trustees of Hibaldstow War Memorial Club**



It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Ronald Coates aged 91. Ron has been a Trustee since the 1950's. During that time he has worked tirelessly to ensure that the War Memorial Hall be maintained for

present and future generations. Ron and others addressed in 1956 the issue of a building having outlived its original function becoming neglected. Despite opposition, from some village residents, licensed status was granted for the building, allowing formation in 1956, of the War Memorial Club to occupy the Hall. In July 1974, following total loss in a fire, Ron and colleagues worked to address insurance and financial issues to rebuild the Hall. In more recent times he has overseen Charity Commission Registration. Until his passing, Ron acted as Correspondent and Treasurer of Trustees. In recent years he ensured that the Trustees remained up to strength and guorate. Accordingly, Trustees will continue to carry out their responsibilities of maintaining The War Memorial Hall.

# World War One Memorial Tablet

As a result of research by several residents, it has become apparent that five names are worthy of addition. Accordingly the Trustees have approved addition of names to the tablet:

# A Havercroft; J Havercroft; E Watmough; FT Watmough; FA Wright.

As the tablet cannot be removed it will have to be engraved by hand at a cost in the region of £600. It is hoped that the work will be completed before the next Armistice Day Service.

# **Books Discussed**

**The Shepherd's Life by James Rebanks** (It had been a Radio 4 Book of the week) Some people's lives are entirely their own creations. James Rebanks' isn't. The first son of a shepherd, who was the first son of a shepherd himself, he and his family have lived and worked in and around the Lake District for generations. Their way of life is ordered by the seasons and the work they demand, and has been for hundreds of years. A Viking would understand the work they do: sending the sheep to the fells in the summer and making the hay; the autumn fairs where the flocks are replenished; the gruelling toil of winter when the sheep must be kept alive, and the light-headedness that comes with spring, as the lambs are born and the sheep get ready to return to the fells. As always a real diversity of opinion about this book and, as always, one member said that had it not been for Book Club she would not have read this book.

Some people felt that it was not well written, the writing style was hard to get to grips with. However, nearly all who had read it said that some of the facts were really interesting as was the lack of chapters and organising the book around the seasons. There was a real sense of history as well as a sense of place and continuity and he always knew where he belonged. One person thought that the book gave her a 'feel good' factor.

A surprising piece of information in the book was that the writer went to study at Oxford having left school at 15.

We scored this book between **5/10** and **7/10**.

#### In Her Wake by Amanda Jennings

A tragic family event reveals devastating news that rips apart Bella's comfortable existence. Embarking on a personal journey to uncover the truth, she faces a series of traumatic discoveries that take her to the ruggedly beautiful Cornish coast, where hidden truths, past betrayals and a 25-year-old mystery threaten not just her identity, but also her life. Chilling, complex and profoundly moving, In Her Wake is a gripping psychological thriller that questions the nature of family – and reminds us that sometimes the most shocking crimes are committed closest to home.

One question that this book threw up was 'Is it right to take a child away from a family? And we spent some time discussing this issue. Whether people liked or disliked the book overall we felt that it was well written but then some felt that it was enthralling, compelling, and a real page turner whilst others loathed it. One person thought that the pacing to this story lured you in nicely to the story and then threw you off guard with another taut twist in the tale or another secret you weren't quite expecting. She also said that the book had a real WOW factor for her. Another person thought that the book was a real disappointment and she did not like the predictable, trite outcome and felt that the story was quite simply unbelievable, full of incredible coincidences and awful characterisations. Yet again such diversity of opinion! We scored the book from **3/10** to **9/10** 

**Perfect Daughter by Amanda Prowse (**This was a World Book Night Book) Once upon a time, Jacks Morgan had dreams. She would have a career and travel the world. She would own a house on the beach, and spend long nights with her boyfriend strolling under the stars.

But life had other ideas. First Martha came along, then Jonty. then her mother moved in, and now their little terrace is bursting at the seams. Jacks gave up on her dreams to look after her family. If only, just for once, her family would look after her...

One person said that it was one of the worst books she had ever read, in fact, she thought it dire. The storyline was predictable, unbelievable, boring and very difficult to persevere with until the end. It was dull, dull, dull!!

Comments which kept being repeated were dull, boring, what a dreary life she led and did nothing about it. It showed what a humdrum mundane life she led. Many of the characters were implausible one dimensional and unconvincing. Even the main characters name irritated one member.

All in all it was not well received although a few people said that it had been an easy read and that they felt that it was quite believable.

We scored the book from **2/10** to **6/10** (The 'dire' member gave it a **0/10**)

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





~	Playground Station Road	50	44	The playground is set in a large playing field. There is an adjacent skate park and a tennis court. Some of the play equipment is ageing and could do with some updating but the skateboard facility is attractive and well-maintained. There was some litter on the grass around the playground and on the tennis court which has a poor surface. There was limited seating and a rusted litter bin.
~	Churchyard Church Street	50	45	The church occupies a pleasant site, framed by mature trees. The churchyard was tidy with well-tended grass and well-maintained hedges and bushes, although the area at the east end of the churchyard is a little overgrown. There were a number of graves with weeds and a small amount of litter.
~	Community planting Scheme	50	46	There were some good examples of community planting throughout the village including colourful displays under the village signs on entry. Good planting is in evidence on Redbourne Road, Brigg Road, Hopfield, St Albans Close and the corner of Church Street and Station Road.
~	War Memorial West Street	50	47	This simple but effective memorial is well maintained and tidy. The planting is colourful and thoughtful with 6 neatly placed wreaths on the wall. There were a few weeds on the path and the verge to one side could do with some attention.

Although the Parish Council was not placed this year in the competition they are reasonable happy with the results although there is some room for improvement. As previously reported the Parish Council along with the Village Hall Committee are actively seeking grant funding to upgrade the play area located at the village hall.

I was in Lincoln on Saturday and leaving the Cathedral by the refectory door to cross Eastgate. The Cathedral grounds were becoming thick with leaves. There was the feeling that autumn has come, seasons of mist and mellow fruitfulness. Golden fields have been harvested and soon

some of us will be singing 'All is safely gathered in'. It's a time for being thankful for all our blessings, for asking questions about sharing but also for asking ourselves what are the things that matter most.

Some of us when we lead worship follow a lectionary, a calendar of suggested readings for each Sunday of the year. On the Sunday following the day when I have prepared this article one of the readings is a story which Jesus told of an unjust steward which makes us ask questions about justness and fairness (Gospel of Luke Chapter 16 verses 1-13). But reading the story over and over has been making me ask guestions about how we ask put a value on things. This is not a tirade against wealth or riches. Perhaps it is asking what are the things that really count and do we value those things on which you just can't put a value. When I am in London I love going to the National Gallery and looking around centuries of artwork on which a value cannot be placed. I am fascinated by the history of art and the stories behind some of the artists. Some of those pictures will be worth hundreds of thousands or even perhaps millions of pounds. But then I reflect and wonder whether we are in possession of things so much more valuable. I was once asked if I had to save valuable possessions in my house what would they be. I had to think. My ordination Bible? The visitors book in the manse which contains many of the signatures of people I have entertained over nearly forty years of ministry? A photo of my wonderful parents? There are things that are ours upon which you cannot put a price and these days of getting and spending I wonder what those things might be for you. What are the things that really matter?

And then I reflect that perhaps the most valuable thing of all is the human life. We have been reminded of the old images that haunted us so many years ago of a naked girl, her flesh burning fleeing for her life in Vietnam. That image stayed with many people for many years. Every human life is precious to God even the lives of those we find it hard to like or love. We need to learn to see the image of God in each other and to see each other as being precious to him. Others are worth our love and care. It might just change them. The most precious things of all is the human soul and you can't put a price on that. Just thinking ©

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# October 2016 - November 2016 Article by Rev. David Eames

There's a fine line between vigilance and paranoia and between caution and hysteria and it's a line that I'm going to attempt to

tread in this article.

This summer's gaming sensation has been Pokemon Go – a smartphone game where imaginary creatures and accessories are looked for and captured in real life locations. Some have praised it for getting coach-potato gamers out of their houses and walking around, whilst others have pointed out the dangers of people walking onto roads or into streams; causing accidents or making themselves vulnerable to crime by playing the game. A few people are warning of the spiritual damage that Pokemon can do.

This latter group look at the 'worldview' of the game. Pokemon is short for 'pocket monsters' and the Pokemon have different abilities, for example reading of minds, use of poison, mimicry, taunting, teleportation and hypnosis. The concept of the original game of Pokemon is that you capture these Pokemon, 'train' them and then 'summon' them to fight against other people's Pokemon. This, they say, is very similar to the practices of summoning and trying to control spiritual beings and forces that are found in witchcraft, Wicca, shamanism and spiritism, all of which the Bible warns against. They also point to the testimony of former witchdoctors such as Bautista who, with no prior knowledge of the game, identified some Pokemon with demons they had encountered.

However, whilst some of the underlying themes and concepts of Pokemon are based on unChristian and potentially dangerous worldviews, it is after all just a game. The same can't be said, on the other hand for those who 'dabble' in witchcraft, Wicca, mediums, psychics, spiritism etc. These are very real attempts to summon and control very real spiritual beings and forces. The problem with these practices, apart from the dubious techniques used by some of the practitioners, is that although the spiritual forces are real, only demonic forces would use these means. This is because God has forbidden these practices so no force for good would use them, despite them seeming to be harmless or even caring. St Paul warns us the "Satan himself masquerades as an angel of light. It is not surprising, then, if his servants also masquerade as servants of righteousness." (2 Corinthians 11:14-15).



There is no such thing as good magic, the dead cannot be communicated with and spiritual forces are beyond the command of humans. What will respond if you call on these things are evil spirits that we are unable to control. However,

the Bible records loads of occasions where Jesus demonstrated his power over evil forces, and ultimately "God defeated the spiritual rulers and powers. With the cross God won the victory and defeated them. He showed the world that they were powerless" (Colossians 2:15). 



# Obituary - Pete Gilbert 1931 - 2016

It is with much sadness that the family of Pete Gilbert announce his death on 7th September 2016.

In the modern world it is rare for somebody to live their entire lives in a single settlement, yet Pete did just that. Born on March 25th 1931 at 'Sunny View' on the corner of Mill Road and Redbourne Road in a house designed and built by his father, he first met his future wife Sheila (née Massey) at the age of just five, on her first day at school. He apparently stuck out his tongue and said he didn't need silly girls at his school!

As he matured, he came to realise that girls weren't so silly after all and they became inseparable. Their only time apart was when Pete did his national service in Germany. They were married soon afterwards in 1955 and settled on Church Street in a house that he designed. Their children, Katrina and David, were born in 1960 and 1967 respectively.

A devoted family man, Pete rejected good career prospects in favour of quality family time and in particular weekends away in their caravan pulled by his lovely old Ford Zephyr.

After his family his other passion was the village of Hibaldstow and in particular the church. During his life he held too many posts to list but included bell ringer, verger, PCC member and church treasurer.

His interest in photography developed during his time in the RAF (he was posted to a photographic reconnaissance squadron in Gutersloh) but in his retirement it came together with his love of the village when he began to collect old photographs of Hibaldstow. His collection is as comprehensive as it is expansive and is perhaps the activity for which he is best known in the village, following numerous exhibitions of his work.

He enjoyed a long and happy retirement- keeping himself busy with jobs too numerous to mention but in particular helping to bring up grandchildren Leigh, Paul, Katie and Joseph. He and Sheila also moved into a bungalow just around the corner on Ford Lane, again to Pete's design. They celebrated their diamond wedding anniversary just last year and received a card from the Queen.

Pete died surrounded by his loving family, having fulfilled his wish to die in the village he loved so much. His funeral is at **11am** on **Wednesday 28th September** at **Hibaldstow Parish Church**, in which he was both christened and married.

July saw a visit from pupils at Hibaldstow Academy who came for a look around our facilities just before breaking up for the summer holidays - staff on site gave them informative chats on how the parachutes are packed and how they work, along with tours around the aircraft under the watchful eye of our

experienced pilots as well as teach them the basic skydiving body position - fun was had by all. We would like to thank all the pupils for the pictures they sent in following this visit, we are currently arranging a display in our clubhouse for these.

August saw the return of our annual competition - the UK National Skydiving Championships - the biggest skydiving competition of its kind in the world which we are proud to host. We had some very challenging weather with strong winds the first weekend (20-22nd August) and at times very overcast. The second weekend (27th-29th August), however we managed to complete all the rounds in all categories by the end of the second weekend.

The first weekend begins on Friday evening where the 4 way and VFS (vertical formation skydiving) teams arrive for an opening brief & ceremony at which time the competition rounds are drawn. With three categories having 8 rounds to complete and the senior AAA category having 10 rounds to complete. In addition the VFS teams also compete this weekend and their rounds are drawn at the same time. The aim for all categories is to build as many of the formations for each round in a set time, the more formations the more points they score, the teams with the highest score in each category win that. Judges watch the video footage and score each team, where each completed formation scores a point. The more formation are turned and score more points as they are more complex and harder to build. This year again saw our sponsored team - Satori XL win the AAA category with other members from our company in team 4Mula take silver. In the Rookie category Hibaldstow trained and coached teams took all the podium positions, which we hope is the shape of things to come as they progress - watch this space!

The second weekend has 8 way teams competing, again arriving on Friday evening for the opening brief & ceremony where the rounds are drawn, this weekend also sees speed competitors take part in seeing who can give the fastest freefall as well as artistics categories which is where teams are scored on the technical and difficulty aspects of the skydive.

Many of the competitors who won at the higher levels are heading out to Chicago to take part in a world meet and represent Great Britain - we wish them every success.

September 3rd and 4th saw an attempt to set a new head down record, which saw some of the top skydivers from around the UK congregate in Hibaldstow, whilst they did beat the existing record, it was not valid as the full pre-jump formation agreed was not built so they came extremely close, maybe next time.

Our season begins to slow down now with us closing Mondays and Tuesdays from the start of October,

Our cafe is still open Wednesday through to Sunday with hot and cold drinks and food available every day including our bar which is open each day too, so if anyone is looking for something to do feel free to pop up and



watch the action unfold. As ever, **if readers of** the **Village Voice** mention this, they will be entitled to a **discount** at the cafe as well as if they would like to do a skydive please contact our **booking office** on **01132 505 600** for more information and to book the experience.

On top of all this, we are currently looking forward to seeing our 25th year in business as Skydive Hibaldstow and welcome any information people from the village may be able to offer - amusing stories and interesting pictures are all welcome. As I am sure some people will already know, Hibaldstow Airfield holds some great history and with the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight having recently fully restored the Spitfire AB910, which has a unique story linking it to the airfield, there is a lot more that I am sure people will be able to tell me about the airfield and its background.
