What is and what is not allowed in a churchyard is set out in the Churchyard Regulations 2008 (updated 2012) of the Diocese of Lincoln, which are available on request from the Rev. David Eames or on the Diocese of Lincoln's website. With regards to artificial flowers it states that "No artificial flowers may be placed in a churchyard except Remembrance Day poppies, traditional Christmas wreaths and good quality silk flowers, and these shall be removed within 3 months. The PCC has authority to remove any artificial flowers which do not comply." [Para 4 (i)]. We would be grateful if any floral tributes that are left conform with the Churchyard Regulations. Books Discussed

A Delicate Truth by John Le Carré

A 2013 spy novel set in 2008 and 2011. The plot revolves around a British/ American covert mission in Gibraltar and its consequences for those involved both directly and indirectly, particularly civil servant Toby Bell and retired civil servant Sir Christopher Probyn who choose to work together at increasing personal risk to get to the bottom of what is being covered up about the operation and those who took part.

This was not one of our most popular books but even the member who was least impressed found one part that they liked – a section set in a Cornish Village and manor house that focused more on country and gypsy life and traditions than on espionage.

Some members didn't enjoy the book to start with, feeling that they didn't know what was going on or that the opening scenario was 'weird', and some didn't enjoy the ending as it left you wanting to know what happened, but by persevering most seemed to have found that they were drawn into the intrigue and were rewarded with an enjoyable read. It was accepted that the ending was good in its way and appreciated that the book might not have worked if the story had not cut off so abruptly at the point it did.

It was commented that readers get the impression that the author does not have a good opinion of 'the establishment'.

Scores ranged from 6/10 to 8/10 with one member giving it 2/10.

Beware of Pity by Stefan Zweig

An Austro-Hungarian cavalry officer stationed at the edge of the empire is invited to a party at the home of a rich local landowner and at the ball makes a faux pas when he asks the host's daughter to dance only to find that she is disabled and unable to walk. Their mutual embarrassment causes a bit of a scene and our young officer flees the house, only to be overcome by guilt and in his keenness to make up for his mistake allows himself to become embroiled in the family's life in a way which has devastating consequences on both sides. Stefan Zweig is considered to be a great writer. This is his only novel. A numbe of members had looked up the author and found him to have led quite an unusual life, or at least had an unusual death as he and his wife committed suicide together in South America in 1942.

One member found the book frustrating after losing patience completely with the main character. Someone else commented that they didn't find any of the characters likeable.

The lack of chapters was commented on and made it more difficult to read for some. It was also commented that the novel felt too long.

One member commented that the book made them feel uncomfortable but that that wasn't necessarily a criticism. A number of people felt that it was a significant work that they were glad to have read.

Other positive comments were that it keeps you reading, is easy to read, is a brilliant book, and is gruelling but well-written.

These differing opinions were reflected in the scores ranging from 3/10 to 8/10.

For our October meeting we had the pleasure of Pam Braithwaite talking to us about her walk along The Inca Trail which she did in memory of her sister who had died of leukaemia. She did it for

the Anthony Nolan Trust which matches people with the same tissue type for bone marrow and blood stem cell transplants.

HIBALDSTOW W.I.

Pam, at 58, was the oldest in a group of 44 trekkers and 77 porters. Prior to her trip a typical training session meant walking up and down Steep Hill in Lincoln six times – without stopping.

Most of the group met for the first time at Heathrow wearing their Anthony Nolan t-shirts. Acclimatisation meant an overnight stay in Cusco at 3,400m. The trail itself starts at 2,600m and goes up and down; Dead Woman's Pass being the highest point at 4,200m, and finishing at Machu Picchu at 2,430m. Although the trail is only 28miles long it took 5 days to complete. Porters

encouraged the trekkers to go at their own pace and were supportive to everyone to the extent of carrying those who succumbed to altitude sickness. Pam was given a piggy-back by one porter while two more held on to her legs! Hygiene was of great importance. Everyone had to thoroughly wash and dry their hands, then use alcohol gel. This to prevent disease, infection and contamination. Emphasis was placed on eating properly and resting well. The porters had the welfare of their charges at heart.

The trail is closed for two months of the year to rest and recover.

Pam fulfilled her sister's plea that she abandon her comfort zone and do something amazing. She has kept in touch with her fellow trekkers, who live far and wide, one of whom she visited in Australia.

For our **November** meeting we took an apron and a small rolling pin. Hilarity and fun as we made a 'sort of fairy' out of modelling icing!!

December 2017/ January 2018 Article

The carol "God rest ye merry, gentlemen" is one my favourite carols, and it is for a lot of others. carols, and it is for a lot of others too. Partly it's to do with the traditional sounding tune and partly it's because it expresses the emotions of Christmas - "O tidings of comfort and joy!"

Christmas for a lot of people is a time for joy: when you get together with loved ones for feasts and celebrations. Christmas is also a time that is often characterised by images of comfort: the sense of 'hygge' associated with candles, fires and lights shining in the darkness. These are of course all part of Christmas, but the 'tidings of comfort and joy' that Christmas brings go much deeper and are for everyone, including (and perhaps especially for) those who will be lonely, or in pain, or sorrowful this Christmas.

The carol is very clear about why the message of Christmas is one of comfort and joy: "for Jesus Christ our Saviour was born on Christmas Day." Well, that sounds a very obvious thing to say about Christmas, (although you might struggle to find references to Jesus sometimes!) but it then goes on to remind us why this is good news. He came "to save us all from Satan's power when we had gone astray" and "to free all those who trust in him from Satan's power and might." The reason Jesus' birth is special is because of his death. Christmas is only worth celebrating because of Easter.

This is truly joyful tidings! Sin is rebellion against God's authority; when we sin we ally ourselves with his arch-rebel, Satan, so we are under Satan's power. Once there, we can do nothing to free ourselves. However, although we have rejected God, he never rejects us. So he showed his love to the world by sending his Son, Jesus, so that through his death our sins could be forgiven and we could be freed from Satan's power. For all those who keep trying to be good and failing, Jesus' birth is a reason to be joyful.

These are also comforting tidings, especially for those who feel burdened by quilt. Jesus' death comforts those who mourn as it assures us that God understands what grief is like, but more than that, Jesus' resurrection reminds us that eternal life is offered to the world. However, the comfort that Christmas brings is not just a consoling feeling, as 'comfort' is used in it's original meaning of 'strengthening'. By freeing us from Satan's power, Jesus strengthens us with the knowledge that God thinks we're worth dying for. As we've been freed from Satan's power and influence, with the knowledge of God's opinion of us and the promise of his Holy Spirit to help us, we are strengthened to live as children of God.

It is with these tidings that God will 'rest' (in the original sense of 'keep, or cause to remain') all of us, whether we're gentlemen or not, merry both at Christmas time and throughout the year. So, in the name of Jesus, whose birth the angels announced and made shepherds rejoice, I bless you and your loved ones with knowing the true comfort and joy of Christmas.

It would seem, that with a little tender care, many exotic plants are hardy given the right environment. And who knew that certain bamboos, wherever they are in the world, flower at about the same time even though flowering may occur 50 to 100 years apart. Rudie brought an array of plants, including palms and cordylines, explaining their differences and how to look after them.

He also came with a Wollemi pine grown from seed. Until 1994, when a tree was discovered in a remote steep gorge in Australia, it was known only through fossil records.

The question and answer session following the talk ended as cups of tea were finished. It could have gone on for an hour or two longer.
