Book Club Minutes provided by Heather McSharry - 7 December 2017

#### **Books discussed:**

#### Sapiens, A Brief History of Humankind by Yuval Noah Harrari

In this non-fiction book Yuval Noah Harrari sets the features of modern human societies in the context of homo sapiens development from our arrival on the planet among other sapiens to present day.

Negative comments included feelings of boredom and that 'life's too short' but Sapiens was generally well received. Positive comments included it being well written, well researched, enjoyable, interesting, accessible in style, and educational. A lot of our readers reported conflicting feelings about the book. One member said it was one of the most interesting books they'd ever read but also one of the most difficult to read. Another said that it was brilliantly written but as boring as a long history lesson. This was echoed by a member who had struggled reading the sections on the spread of the different sapiens across the continents because they found it difficult to imagine but that they could identify much more with the content once it moved closer to present day.

There was a general consensus that it was best to read bit by bit rather than all in one go and that this is made easy by the way each chapter is divided into sections. This attitude was partly because some found it repetitive and partly due to the enormous number of facts contained – many of which we had never heard before.

It was commented that the author puts his own stamp on the history and 'prehistory' he is reporting on; that he gives the impression that everything was fine until we arrived; and that it makes quite uncomfortable reading in some places. Comparisons were drawn with Blue Planet.

A number of people abstained from scoring, saying it was too difficult to decide what score to give such a book but those who did score it gave 9's and 10's.

#### A Winter's Tale by Trisha Ashley

Sophy, who longs for a settled home after moving around a lot during her upbringing with her wandering bohemian mother, inherits her childhood home – Winter's End, a stately home steeped in tradition and legend, particularly surrounding Alys Blezzard, a supposed witch who married into the family in Elizabethan times. Battles of opinion ensue with her aunt, her head gardener, local flirtatious femme, and dodgy cousin Jack who was expecting to inherit the house himself.

February 2018 Article

The Ash Wednesday service, which marks the beginning of Lent, often contains these words: 'Since early days Christians have observed with great devotion the time of our Lord's passion and resurrection and prepared for this by a season of penitence and fasting. By carefully keeping these days, Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel, and so grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord'. In the early days of the Church Easter was the principal occasion for baptism and so Lent also became a time when adult candidates for baptism were instructed in the Christian faith. This could often be the intensification of a process that could last two years or more.

This Process was known as 'Catechesis' and involved teaching to Christianity about the basics of the Christian faith and practice, usually in the form of questions and answers. Although common in the Early Church, the practice of catechesis was neglected and only revived at the Reformation. Since then the popularity of catechesis has waned, ironically in part due to the rise of Sunday Schools. Although the Sunday School movement was great for familiarising children with various Bible stories, this was often at the expense of any form of grounding in the basic beliefs, practices, and ethics of the faith. As a consequence of this neglect of catechesis many people throughout the ages have grown up with a vague connection to Christianity, and may even call themselves Christians, but have little idea of what that even means.

At this point I need to hold my hands up and claim a partial responsibility for this situation. In the book of Common Prayer, written at a time of the Reformation, Archbishop Thomas Cranmer included a Catechism 'An Instruction to be learned of every person before he be brought to be Confirmed by the Bishop' and the Vicar of 'every Parish shall diligently upon Sundays and Holy-days, after the second Lesson at Evening Prayer, opening in Church instruct and examine so many Children of his Parish sent unto him, as he shall think convenient, in some part of this Catechism'. The aim was that every candidate for Confirmation 'can say, in their mother tongue, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments; and also can answer to the other questions of this short Catechism'. I have to admit I have been lax in teaching the children of the parish the Catechism (although few are sent to me for it!!)

However, there has been a recent revival in interest in catechisms, with one of the megachurches in New York, the Redeemer Presbyterian Church, producing 'The New City Catechism' and The Anglican Church of North America also producing a catechism titled 'To be a Christian - An Anglican Catechism'. Both of these use the traditional question and answer format to teach comprehensively what it means to be a Christian.

This Lent as we are invited again to examine our faith, perhaps look up one of the catechisms and see what we may have been missing out on for years!
