From "Inventories of Church Bells and Plate" in the Public Record Office, dated May 19th 1953, it appears that Hibaldstow church had three bells, one sanctus bell and two chalices. Robert Layke was the vicar and Robert Slledman and Thomas Corbryg were churchwardens.



Every year those of us who use the village hall and playing fields are exposed to a different generation of youngsters.

Most of the kids really are very decent but every year, we are exposed to one or two who test our patience.

This year we have a particularly unpleasant few individuals. Last autumn the cricket containers were broken in to by a chap from near Doncaster. He broke the lock on the cricket score hut. Rather than fixing it we left the door unlocked, so the village kids could sit out of the rain as nothing of value is ever stored in there. This has worked well until the end of April when somebody decided to defecate in the score hut. Who knows if this was a kid or an adult, but in either case they can have no self-respect. They didn't clean themselves up after the act, let alone the hut!

A few days later we found that somebody had taken a tin of bitumen paint that was stored in the corner of the hut and spread it around the interior. I have no doubt this was not the act of an adult. Did your little darling come home around May Day with their hands or clothes marked with black paint? If so, now you know how it happened.

These are just two examples, there are many others, including a fire that almost set light to the contents of one of the containers. That would have caused thousands of pounds worth of damage.

We try really hard to work with the village kids. We were all young once. But there is a limit to how often we can turn the other cheek. This vandalism costs hundreds of pounds each year to rectify.

You may not care two hoots about the cricket club, the football club, the village hall or any other organisation but, I hope that you care about your kids and their future. Please help them grow up without a police record. Please help them to grow up as good citizens of a decent society. Please help them to help themselves, and us, by advising them against pointless vandalism. Thank you.

Books Discussed

Blindness by José Saramago

This book was not everyone's choice as its subject matter was dark and sombre, however for those who had read it some said they would not have read it, unless for the Book Club. One person said that she found it an excellent read and found it compelling. Generally the book was given a mixed reaction.

It was described as a challenging, intriguing and harrowing book which some found difficult to get into. The book deals with an epidemic of blindness and is a social commentary on how humans respond and react when normal life is put on hold. It is a study on how humanity would react to such a situation and explores man's inhumanity to man and the breakdown of society. Someone mentioned it was like being blind to your own personality, and how blindness made them all vulnerable. It is written with some skill as the author has not given people names, but referred to them as individuals, such as the Doctor or the Doctor's wife. Some people did not realise the book contained no named character's. The city in which it is set is nameless so it could be anywhere. The text is written with no speech marks, the sentences run into each other so lack of paragraphs etc.

The lack of speech marks, made it confusing to know who was talking. It was interesting to note that the blind characters themselves found it difficult to work out who was talking. It raised a lot of unanswered questions and gave food for thought around moral issues, for example the Doctor's wife who put her principles aside to killed someone to save/ protect other women. The Doctor's wife was the only character who was left 'seeing' and she took on the role of looking after everyone.

Someone talked about a theme of uncleanliness and excrement pervading the book. The characters were forever wading through excrement (one reader felt that the book focused too heavily on this matter). It was notable how quickly things could deteriorate; they were all filthy as they found it difficult to keep clean. We take for granted having a shower/bath and being independent. This lead to having a general discussion on toilets, bathrooms, and prior to modern convenience's having a cooper bath before the fire and outside loo's.

The author has written a sequel to this book called "Seeing".

The scores for this book were on a range between 4/10 and 10/10. Once again, a book which prompted a great diversity of opinions.









Members were asked to bring along a book title which had meant a lot to them and to give or not give a reason. It was fascinating and as always with the Book Club showed a great diversity on book choices.

HIBALDSTOW ASTRONOMICAL SOCIETY



The night sky is dominated by the Jupiter. It is the largest planet in our solar system and is the brightest in the night sky at the moment. A view through a telescope will show the striped cloud system and its four large moons. These

moons are in constant motion and change position each night. Just one of the sights enjoyed by our members.

Following a grant from the Brigg Bio-Mass Plant, our society has just taken delivery of our new Solar Telescope that lets us view our own star the Sun in complete safety. Sights that are usually only visible during a total eclipse can now be seen on any sunny day. These telescopes are quite expensive, our system cost £1400 so getting that grant was very helpful. Everyone should take care when looking at the Sun as damage to the eyes will be caused and use of any binoculars or ordinary telescopes will cause serious damage.

Whilst we are a members society, guests are always welcome to come to our meetings. Our admission charge for guests will be \pounds 3 when we have a speaker otherwise it is the usual \pounds 2.

Our monthly meetings are normally held on the last Wednesday of each month in the Church Hall with doors open at 7.15pm for a 7.30pm start. We also have a yearly membership subscription scheme of \pounds 10. It is always advisable to check beforehand as we sometimes have to change the meeting dates at short notice. Jun / July 2017 Article by Rev. David Eames

You may agree with Brenda from Bristol, and when thinking about the forthcoming General Election exclaim "Not another one!" But whether we like it or not we are having another election. Brenda's reaction perhaps reflects a more widely

held weariness about yet another chance to 'have our say'. That is why the Archbishops of Canterbury and York wrote in their recent letter to the Parishes and Chaplaincies of the Church of England that one of their obligations "at these times is to set aside apathy and cynicism and to participate, and encourage others to do the same."

It is easy to take for granted the privilege we have to vote in democratic elections but the example of the Suffragettes and the Chartists to name just a couple should remind us that the right to vote was one that had to be fought for. And we only have to look around the world to see places where free and fair elections are not possible. However, that doesn't mean that we can be so naïve as to think that democracy is a perfect system nor as arrogant as to think that we should impose Western style democracy on other nations. But here in this country we do have the right to vote and we should use it.

The Archbishops also say that Christians have the higher obligation to pray for those standing for office, and to continue to pray for those who are elected. They encourage us "to engage prayerfully with the candidates and issues in this election" and to "recognise the enormous responsibilities and the vast complexity of the issues that our political leaders face. We are constantly reminded of the personal costs and burdens carried by those in political life and by their families." This will involve the criticising of policies for their logical, economic and moral flaws and perhaps holding these policies up for ridicule but in our examination of the issues and policies we should not forget that the politicians are all human beings

However, importantly, the Archbishops say that "Contemporary politics needs to re-evaluate the importance of religious belief." This might seem an obvious thing for them to say but their further statements show that this is deeper than saying that religious belief should be respected. They say "Religious belief is the well-spring for the virtues and practices that make for good individuals, strong relationships and flourishing communities" and "The assumptions of secularism are not a reliable guide to the way the world works." They are reminding us that none of us are neutral or impartial in our outlook, all of our actions and thoughts stem from particular worldviews; some religious, some non-religious.
