The Tea Planter's Wife by Dinah Jefferies

Nineteen-vear-old Gwendolvn Hooper steps off a steamer in Cevlon full of optimism, eager to join her new husband. But the man who greets her at the tea plantation is not the same one she fell in love with in London. Distant and brooding, Laurence spends long days wrapped up in his work, leaving his young bride to explore the plantation alone. It's a place filled with clues to the past, locked doors, a yellowed wedding dress in a dusty trunk, an overgrown grave hidden in the grounds, far too small for an adult...

One person who did complete the book thought it tedious whilst another thought it lightweight and a fairly formulaic example of a typical girlish romance which unfortunately was also repetitive. The rest of the group, including the reviews which had been sent in, were really complementary about the book and felt that the book took us on a cultural and atmospheric journey through Cevlon is the 1920's. We also felt that the book gave us food for thought and at times was verv sad.

We felt that the author's knowledge and research shone through in this book from the vibrant and alluring descriptions of the landscape and the house which made them easy to picture, to the method of tea production and also the cultural side of things back in Ceylon in the 1920's. We were impressed with her knowledge of the political angst surrounding the Tea Farmers, their Workers, and others in 1920's Ceylon. Racism was at an all-time high at this time in Ceylon, and we felt that this book demonstrated that.

It was fascinating to hear that one of our member's mother had been brought up on a tea plantation and she felt that this book was really realistic. She said that her grandfather had looked after a tea factory and basically that is how it was We discussed at length how each life should have the same value placed on it but that is not always the case as colour, race, religion etc come into play thus making it seem that some lives are more valuable than others and that should not be the case. Some people had been to Sri Lanka, had fallen in love with it and could empathise with the setting of the book.

There was certainly an element of secrecy running through the book and although the storyline flowed at a very slow pace at times we thought that it worked well for this detailed and evocative book which had so much pain and loss...betraval, jealousy and guilt woven amongst all of the characters. One person really captured the mood we felt when she said that she thought that the book was "very sedate, even though the subject matter was tricky in places and that the author was almost whispering through it."

Again the scoring covered a wide range from 5/10 to 9/10 and one person said it was a definite 10/10 for her!!

HIBALDSTOW BOOK CLUB

A very select group met for the April meeting but we had received comments about the books via email from members unable to attend so we had a lot to discuss and as always, a lively evening ensued.

Books Discussed

Memory Man by David Baldacci

When Amos Decker returned home eighteen months ago to find the bodies of his wife and only daughter, he didn't think he could carry on living. Over whelmed with grief, he saw his life spiral out of control, losing his job as a detective, his house and his self-respect. But when his former partner in the police, Mary Lancaster, visits to tell him that someone has confessed to the murder of his family, he knows he owes it to his wife and child to seek justice for them.

Of the people at the meeting two had really struggled with this book, one gave up halfway through feeling that it was more like a script for a very cheap American drama. The other person, although attempting to read it a few times, had failed to connect with it or the writing style. They both felt that it was laboured and repetitive. A couple of reviews which were sent in found it lightweight, fairly formulaic, repetitive and a bit drawn out.

However, the rest of the people at the meeting, and the other reviews sent in, absolutely loved the book, to the extent that one person has read three more by the same author. One of the reviews we received said

"I would never have picked this book off the shelf. I looked at the cover and thought 'OMG' – not my sort of book..... and then I say down to a fantastic rip-roaring / couldn't put it down / don't interrupt me / page turner of a read and I loved it! I am hooked!"

Those who had read it really thought it an excellent read, maybe not great literature but great entertainment. Words such as intriguing, interesting, jolly good read with good descriptive parts (possibly gory!) and basically was good value. They also felt that the author managed to hook them straight in, twist them around some then spit them out the other side feeling like they had been on a reading rollercoaster. They also felt that there were great characters in the book and basically David Baldacci was a really terrific storyteller.

It was certainly a very different book with an unusual and flawed hero, with a mental capability that was both blessing and curse, and the fact that someone was out to destroy him. Hence people feeling that it was a really interesting read. One person said that it reminded her of 19 Minutes by Jodi Picoult.

(The Last Mile, the sequel to Memory Man is out on April 19th) As always scoring covered a wide range, from **4/10** to **9/10** and of course the two people who did not complete it gave it a zero!

The small rural village of Howsham is the current Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) Northern Lincolnshire Joint Best Kept Village competition champion in the Previous Winners category and was the Best Kept Small Village winner in 2014.

This summer around **10 country village gardens** will be open. Amongst them are some former Yellow Book gardens, a small holding, and a specialist alpine plant garden. Cadney and Howsham will both have lots of red, white and blue planting and bunting as we celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday. Grade 1 listed Cadney

Church will be open; it is one of the oldest churches n the area and will be decorated with flowers.

There will be raffle, tombola, cakes and refreshments in

Howsham Village Hall. Tea and cakes will also be available at Cadney Church Hall. Traditional games and cream teas can be found in some of the gardens, A free minibus service will run throughout the day to take visitors between Cadney and Howsham, and visitors are encouraged to park in Howsham and take the bus to Cadney.

On Thursday 23rd June, voters will be able to have their say over the future of the UK's relationship with the EU. This will

be, and indeed is already being, preceded by lots of comments from religious leaders about the issues, followed by lots of criticisms of religion 'meddling' in politics.

Those who don't approve of religious leaders speaking out on political issues (although they tend only to disapprove if the religious leader holds an opposite opinion!) often make two mistakes. Firstly they assume that faith and politics are separate; that one's faith is a private matter whereas politics is about public issues and never the twain should meet. This is a false division as any faith worth its salt has an outward dimension and has a view about how humans should interact. Indeed, Jesus taught us to ask our heavenly Father "thy kingdom come" and Jesus himself was executed because he represented a threat to the political and religious authorities of his day. The second mistake that is made is to think that a discussion about politics can be held in a neutral, value-free, completely 'rational' environment. We all have a world-view that shapes our thinking about society: for a lot of people that world-view is influenced by their religious beliefs for others it is influenced by their secular beliefs.

So I offer my ha'p'orth on the referendum, two reflections both based on the experience of the Church of England, but on different sides of the argument. Firstly, one of the founding principles of the Church of England was that it was not subject to Rome. Henry VIII reasoned that as he was appointed by God, he was answerable only to God, and therefore that he, not the Pope, was the head of the English church. As the Church of England spread around the world, this principle went with it, so that each national church had the authority to decide matters for themselves without looking to England. Therefore, all the churches of what is now the Anglican Communion have different liturgies and different views on certain issues. Thus the principle of each nation being in supreme control of its own area is central to the history of the Church of England. On the other hand, the Church of England makes no grand claims for itself, it simply states that it is "part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church." It doesn't claim to be the true Church, or the Church in its entirety but just a part of the Church. There's a recognition that it is part of a larger whole and so that it is dependant on, and in partnership with, the rest of the Church These two reflections show that it is possible for a Christian to be on either side of the debate, and indeed www.reimaginingeurope.co.uk is "a space for Christian reflection and debate on Britain's future relationship with Europe" with views on both sides. However you decide to vote, and whatever the result, the Christian prayer to God remains the same "thy kingdom come on earth, as it is in heaven."

No-one wants to be caught out by a crafty scammer. Follow our tips and avoid becoming a victim.

Top 10 tips to avoid scams:

- Be wise to postal scams. No legal company will ask for money to claim a prize.
- Keep personal details safe. They could be used fraudulently in the wrong hands.
- **Research the credentials of the company.** Be certain they're not bogus.
- Be online savvy. Check who you're communicating with online.
- Talk to someone you trust if you're suspicious.
- **Report a scam.** Help expose the criminals
- **Know you are not alone.** Anyone can be a victim, report it and get the right support
